

Number of Traffic Stops z = -1.35








Reason for Stop





Motivation for Stop






Disparity Ratios Defined

% of Drivers on Street, By Race




Disparity Ratios, as Reported by IDOT







Traffic Stops by Race

Accidents by Race












All Traffic Stops: 2015 - 2017






Density of All Traffic Stops: 2015 - 2017






Density of Traffic Stops by Race, 2015 - 2017

African American Drivers




Density of Non-STEP Traffic Stops, 2015-2017






Density of Non-STEP Traffic Stops by Race, 2015-2017






Density of Citizen-Initiated Calls for Service, 2015-2017






Density of Citizen-Initiated Calls for Service and Census Percent African American, 2015-2017






Density of Citizen-Initiated Calls for Service and Non-STEP Traffic Stops, 2015-2017






Density of Citizen-Initiated Calls for Service and Non-STEP Traffic Stops by Race, 2015-2017

Summary

- 2017 YTD
 - Fewer traffic stops
 - Higher percentage of STEP traffic stops
 - No meaningful change in motivation for stop, reason for stop
 - No meaningful change in disparity ratio for stop
 - Fluctuations in disparity ratio for outcomes, but remain close to 1.00
- 2015 2017, spatially
 - High concentration of traffic stops on thoroughfares
 - Non-STEP stops are more broadly distributed
 - Non-STEP African American stops are more broadly distributed
 - Higher concentration in areas with more calls for service
 - Concentration of calls for service in Census tracts with higher percentage of the population that is African American



Next Steps

- Urbana Police
 - Follow-up meetings with council members, if requested
- Mayor
 - Solicit recommendations from city council and staff for any further changes in city practices/policies to reduce racial disparities related to traffic stops
 - Scheduling neighborhood meetings with African-American community in September and October
 - Report back to City Council with recommendations and feedback
