


CRITICAL JUNCTURE FOR 16-ACRE / 9 SQ BLOCKS LINCOLN SQUARE SITE

- Landmark Hotel is closed and for sale.
- Health Alliance and Carle HR are vacating office space in mall
- MCORE project will rebuild Green St.
- Community desire for housing and more activity downtown
- City of Urbana facility planning underway
- Other public entities looking for space





STUDY SITE: Hotel, Mall, Parking





Urbana Lincoln Hotel

- Local historic landmark
- Original built in 1924
- Architect: Joseph Royer
- Broadway and Green

Urbana Landmark Hotel






Back door of the hotel became the front door

Urbana Landmark Hotel

- Multiple owners
- Jumers addition built in 1982
- Two foreclosures in 2000's
- Purchased in 2010 for \$600,000
- Repaid \$1 M city incentives
- Closed in 2015
- Auction: 12/11/17
- Rejected bid of \$3.95 million





LINCOLN SQUARE MALL

- Opened in 1964
- Architect: Victor Gruen
- One of first enclosed downtown malls in U.S.
- Carson Pirie Scott was first anchor tenant and investor
- National Register of Historic Places
- Enveloped front façade of hotel






CURRENT TENANTS







Tips for Civic Architecture

a.k..a. Learning from OKC

- 1. Think of Architecture in terms of **urban form**, not building form.
- Foster a sense of any history by reusing existing buildings whenever possible.
- 3. When you're considering a special new building, sponsor a design competition!
- 4. If you can't conquer gaps with density, bypass them with great and connected civic places.
- 5. Engage university design (ARCH/LA) students as a means to stay ahead of development.



WORKSHOP BRAINSTORMING

- Focus on connectivity between UIUC, Main St., high school/middle school/park district campus via Green St., Broadway Ave., University Ave and neighborhoods on either side.
- Transit connections between UIUC, downtown, OSF & Carle (BRT)
- Re-activate street grid and streetscape on site: pedestrian, vehicular, both?













BRAINSTORMING (CONT)

- "Liberate" the hotel from the mall.
- "Re-skin mall components
- Potential new mall tenants: educational, research and tech, government, arts and entertainment.
- Add residential and mixed use "nodes" in parking lots.
- Civic green, public plaza, Market at the Square







Figure 18: Resource Team Member Hans Bulzer's sketch for Urbana, IL





TAKE AWAYS

- Work with the community to develop a vision for the entire site.
- Explore connectivity within the site and between important nodes in the community.
- Make it a place where people want to BE.









