SUBJECT: An Ordinance Approving a Special Use Permit (Champaign County Jail

Consolidation at 502 South Lierman Avenue / Plan Case 2449-SU-22)

Supplementary Memo

On July 5, 2022, the Committee of the Whole considered a special use permit to allow Champaign County to build an addition on the existing satellite adult detention center at 502 South Lierman Avenue. The special use permit would allow the County to consolidate operations that historically had been split between the satellite detention center and the now-closed downtown detention center.

The Committee of the Whole requested that Champaign County provide additional information about the proposed jail consolidation and about the public input and outreach that has been conducted on this proposal. Champaign County has provided documentation to that end; it is included as an attachment.

Re: Champaign County Jail Special Use Permit Approval

Urbana City Council Members:

Champaign County is requesting a special use permit for the Champaign County Satellite Jail at the upcoming council meeting, and I am writing to follow up on your request at the Committee of the Whole for additional information regarding the project and to encourage you to confirm the recommendation of your Planning Commission to approve our permit.

Per your request for additional information related to our facility decisions, I have attached several links regarding the jail facility for your review.

- The county board's facility committee has been discussing jail consolidation for many years, with agendas and minutes to be found here:

 This committee will continue to hear regular public input and progress reports on design/construction/financing as we move forward.
- In 2021, the County Board established a Jail Facilities Committee specifically to obtain public input and stop "kicking the can down the road" on the decisions regarding the deteriorating downtown jail. Champaign County received almost \$41m from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding.

- The County Board has discussed ARPA appropriations with significant community input at study sessions for that purpose and at the monthly county board meetings. Agendas, handouts and minutes of these meetings may be found here:

- The County Board intends to appropriate \$5m for the jail consolidation from ARPA, from the \$10m allowed for supporting county operations, as jail operation is a major requirement of county government. A \$150,000 allocation for COVID-19 testing at the jail as also approved if funds are not able to be obtained from FEMA.
- The County Board established an ad hoc Community Violence Prevention Task Force specifically to hear from the public prior to determining how to best invest approximately \$4m of the county's American Rescue Plan Act funds for initiatives to reduce community violence. Finally, you may find interesting another memo, attached to this memo, that I wrote to the County Board during preparation of the county budget in 2020 in response to a question about whether the county's funds provide any supports for its low-income and at-risk citizens.

- It is in the best interests of county residents, their families and attorneys to have adequate in-county jail housing for detainees. Currently, well over 100 detainees are being housed in other counties, which is both expensive and inconvenient for all concerned.
- It is in the best interests of the county government to consolidate the downtown and satellite facilities for efficiency, keeping operational costs for the jail as low as possible.
- It is in the best interests of Urbana's residents to free up the downtown lot for other potential uses that could stimulate economic development along Main Street.

The County has reached a crisis point where the downtown jail must be demolished or fully renovated. If the Urbana City Council does not approve this special use permit for consolidation, our next alternative must be to consider renovating the downtown facility, as transporting large numbers of detainees out of county is not sustainable for the County in the long-term. I am asking you to approve our special use permit to move forward.

RE: (Revised) Information regarding social services provided in the county budget

Each year, county departments provide a wide range of services to county residents that fall in the categories of social services, mental health and health services, services to low-income residents, diversion, pre-trial and re-entry services. The attached list of items summarizes funding that is currently allocated through the county's annual budget. In 2020, these activities accounted for \$41,150,127 or 31% of the county's \$129.1 million budget. The list is not exhaustive.

Revenues are from local taxes, shared contributions from state and local partnerships, Federal and state grants and contracts for specific services, fees and fines or even some donations. These services are provided directly by county officials or by other boards funded through the county as part of the county's array of services. Some are mandated; others are discretionary. All of them help strengthen the safety net for county residents.

I am providing the list to facilitate informed discussion by the board about the county's investment in services that may impact the number and outcomes of persons being seen in our county's justice system.
