Urbana Arts Grant 2009 Final Report iLAND, INC – The Mahomet Aquifer Project

Funds from the Urbana Public Art Grant were used for the creative development, performance and public engagement of the **Mahomet Aquifer Project**.

The project presented 5 performances in and around Urbana Oct 10 and 17 at Market at the Square Oct. 14 at the Mahomet Farmers Market Oct 16 at the Krannert Center for the performing arts Oct 18 at a parking lot along Neil Street in Champaign

At each of the performances we had an air stream inside of which was a video created by Jeff Carpenter and Monson of images of the Mahomet Aquifer. The air stream served as a meeting point and place of information exchange about water and local environmental issues

On October 13 we offered a panel at the Urbana Free Library – Moving Perspectives : Approaches to understanding water through geology, environment, art and society with George Roadcap, Illinois Water Survey; Cecily Smith, Prairie Rivers Network; Brett Bloom, artist; Brigit Kelly, poet and Jennifer Monson, choreographer, moderated by Michael Scoville, environmental philosopher.

George Roadcap and Jennifer Monson gave 3 workshops on the Mahomet Aquifer with hands on demonstrations and dance exercises at Wiley Elementary School.

This project had a large impact on my own artistic development. The creative process included a week long research trip to Southern Illinois that initiated the idea of sustained immersive process (SIP) that I am taking into my next project. The collaborative process with all of the artists deeply furthered my own understandings of the phenomenon of the aquifer and approaches to creative practice. Particularly compelling was working with Jeff Carpenter of the AVL team at NCSA. As well as George Roadcap and Dr Schulten at the Beckman Institute. Having the air steam along really helped to ground the project. It was important to perform in these kinds of settings and feel the challenges of offering experimental forms to a community with out much exposure. This spawned fascinating conversations about art and environment.

We reached a large number of the public during our performances in the Farmer's Markets and at KCPA. An estimated 1100 members of the public witnessed the event and probably 500 deeply engaged in conversation and stayed for the duration of the performance. We taught 60 elementary students, 25 people attended the panel and a few people have viewed the video of the aquifer and the performance that are posted online.

The dance included 5 dancers Amy Swanson, Kyli Kleven, Stephen West and Steve May and choreographer Jennifer Monson, Chris Cogburn composed the music and played live during all of the performances, Katrin Schnabl designed the costumes, Jeff Carpenter created the video, George Roadcap served as a consultant.

I was very impressed with all of our collaboration partners. Sam Smith put me in touch with Wiley and the teachers there were open and generous with their time. Carol Inskeep at the Library is a treasure and I would jump at the chance to work with her again. The university

supported the project by lending us the air stream and providing some support for the Krannert Event. Over all I had a good experience across the board. I was particularly impressed with the farmers out at Mahomet who really went the extra mile to get the word out about our performances.
