During the development process, the title of the project "I Remember When..." was changed to "And I Remember". This is the title I will use for this report.

The Public Arts Commission grant was instrumental in the development, creation, marketing and performance of the new play "And I Remember". From July through December, 2009 the project focused on connecting with senior members of the Urbana community through storytelling workshops at the Provena Center for Healthy Aging, Prairie Winds Community for the Older Adult, and Canterbury Ridge Assisted Living Community. Along with my collaborating partner, director Robert Quinlan, we then turned our attention to the creation of a play based upon these interviews. From January through April, grant funds were used for the transcription of interviews, sound editing, rehearsal hours, and the organization of free public performances at three downtown Urbana businesses.

Grant funds allowed us to dedicate time to the planning and execution of storytelling workshops with senior citizens, the editing of these interviews into a workable play script, and the rehearsal of this new play for public performances. From an organizational perspective, we utilized the Urbana Public Arts Commission grant to market the performance with a formal press release, professional graphic design, and through social networking sites. I created and maintained a reservation hotline to monitor attendance for each performance. We were also able to secure in-kind donations of rehearsal space through the Stone Creek Church of Urbana and the Unitarian Universalist Church. The University of Illinois Department of Theatre also became interested in the play as a teaching tool, and assigned two student interns to the project, who were integral to its development.

The creation and performance of "And I Remember" involved a wide scope of Urbana community members and professional artists. As a means of engaging participants for the storytelling workshops, I performed songs and monologues at two luncheons for the Provena Center for Healthy Aging, reaching at least 150 of their members. During the fall we conducted storytelling workshops, interviewing 28 senior citizens as part of the oral history phase of the project. The rehearsal period involved two student interns, a musical director, a graphic designer, a sound editor, as well as the proprietors of the three businesses used as performance spaces. During the performance week, "And I Remember" reached a total audience of 161 and brought new business to Heartland Gallery, V. Picasso Restaurant, and Silver Creek Restaurant.

The many strains of collaboration required to research, write, rehearse, and perform a new play were all deeply satisfying. The staff and residents of both assisted living facilities welcomed us warmly for our storytelling workshops. The Urbana businesses were generous and accommodating to our performance needs. Personally, the creation of "And I Remember" was spiritually enlightening, and the process brought home to me that some of the most beautiful and valuable voices among us—those voices that resonate with the most experience—are often marginalized, and even silenced. I've been reminded to open my ears.

Dear Anna,

As my Urbana Arts Commission granted project, *I Remember When: An Oral history of Urban Seniors* (a working title) has evolved it has been necessary to make some some minor adjustments. I wanted to make you aware of these changes.

First, The storytelling sessions/workshops that we scheduled with The Center for Healthy Aging had no enrollment. So I

decided to partner with 2 retirement/assistant living facilities in Urbana: Canterbury Ridge and Prairie Winds. I have scheduled 4 workshops at each facility in November and December. The interest, attendance and participation of the residents there has been quite successful.

Next, at the November 17, 2009 Fall Luncheon of The Center for Healthy Aging where I had originally planned to do a reading of material gathered at the workshops with local actors ended up being a short performance combined with a very brief storytelling session performed and facilitated by myself and Robert Quinlan. This proved to be successful in enrolling a number of Seniors to meet with us one on one for storytelling sessions. As a result of this there is a slight shift in funds originally budgeted in the grant. In Section B, line 4, Artistic Services,\$75 was budgeted to pay actor stipends for the 11/17 Fall Luncheon. That \$75 will be added to Section A, line 1, Artistic, which will change the total from \$1000 to \$1075.

These are very minor addition. On the Project Expenditures page, Section B, line 1, Supplies/Materials \$175, Expenditures Description should also include production costs, rental fees.office supplies and copies. And Section A, line 1, Artistic \$1075, Expenditures Discription should also include performances.

The Puzzle Painting Project Community Collaboration Final Report

Over 90 diverse community members participated in the Puzzle Painting Project in the fall of 2009. Children, teens, students, adults and seniors helped to paint 10 large-scale famous paintings that were shown at an opening celebration during the Boneyard Arts Festival on April 17th, 2010. The paintings will be on display through the end of May at Amara Yoga & Arts at Lincoln Square in Urbana.

The grant money paid for the materials to make and display the public paintings and allowed the community to create works of art together. By being a free activity, people who may not have been interested due to monetary constraints could be included, thus increasing accessibility.

The paintings pieces were placed on tables in front of Amara during Market at the Square hours on Saturday mornings in the fall. Many of the painters planned on participating, while many more simply happened upon the event and were invited to help paint. The atmosphere was informal, friendly and inviting – people of all ages and walks of life sat around tables painting and talking – making new friends while making art. Many of the participants said they didn't know how to paint, or that they hadn't painting since childhood – or that they were not "good" at making art, and they were pleasantly surprised at how much fun it was and proud of how well their section of the painting turned out. Many of the first time painters returned for several of the Saturday sessions and the project became a part of their weekly routine ~ they started to take ownership in the collaborative project.

The10 finished paintings are surprisingly beautiful and it was exciting to see the participant's reactions at the opening during the Boneyard Arts Festival. Some of the collaborators couldn't quite remember which sections they had painted - but they did remember which paintings they had worked on. Everyone had positive reactions to the finished work and commented on how wonderful the paintings looked. This project is an example of how when we work together as a creative community, we can make remarkable art - art that would not be possible to make alone.





CU residents create collaborative art in downtown Urbana

EverySaturdayfromIO a.m. to noon through the end of October, the studio's art section is sponsoring "Puzzle Painting Project: a Community Collaboration." A community-wide project, the event started in August and allows anyone to paint a piece of an art "puzzle." The painted pieces are assembled later in the evening, revealing themselves to be a tamous piece of art. There are no appointments, call-ins, lines or hidden fees, "Allyou do," said Kathryn Fitzgerala, the art director for the center, "is just show up"

Fitzgerald is micharge of the project, overseeing anyone willing to paint. She encourages participants to get as creative as they want with their respective piece.

"I call it a puzzle because, when they come in to paint the painting, they just see a stack [of squares] traced out," Fitzgerald said. "But they don't know what it is, it's just a piece of the painting they don't know where it lits in the painting." Fitzgerald cuts up pieces from a traced picture of a famous piece of art, and has participants paint a small portion, she believes that disecting the bigger work into smaller pieces adds to the collaboration. As a special education teacher, "Fitgerald said it's important to prake projects of this nature down.

"It makes things easier for kids, or adults," Fitzgerald said. "If you break it down in smallparts, they can accomplish it. Otherwise it's too overwhelming. Like a pointing like this, if one person were to do it, they could not get it done in two hours, And also, Like collaborative work?"

As Amara is an arts studio Fitzgerald said she has had "a lot of art teachers who've shown up, even art teachers from other cities, and real artists " However, Fitzgerald was quick to add that participants in the project have ranged from kids to adults, people with no paining experience to professional artists, and everyone in between. "I've had kids as young as two years old partici-

pate in this project, but usually their parents help them," Fitzgerald said. "And then [we also have] all the way up to women in their 80s. So it's a huge mix of everything in between."

And included among those families, professional artists and shoppers that come in to design a piece. of the souare, Fitzgerald said college students frenuently stop by to add their art to the project. One of these artists is Colleen Paul, a graduate student studying music. She came to the Amara Studio from the Farmer's Market and worked on the project of the week, a Kandinsky painting,

Treally enjoyed it," Paulsaid "It was just a nicealternoon, arelaxing break from my studies, and it was just a really great way to talk and socialize and meet people, because I'm actually new to the area"

Though Paul has dabbled in art, no prior experience or skill is needed to paint a square.

"A lot of times people come here and say, 'I can't paint. You don't have to know now to pain.," Fitzgerald said. "It'slike coloring. You're just coloring in with paint Anybody can do it. A lot of times they'll sit down and they'll start and they'll be like, "Oh yeah, I remember this, I used to do this when I was a kid." No matter what level of painting expertise, Paul thinks U of Estudents should go out and try the community collaborative paintings.


"It's a really good community project to be a part of," said Paul, "and you get the sense that it's not exclusive for only residents of Urbana, but anybody can participate. Also, it's a great way just to really meet other people."

Fitzgera d agrees with Paul's assessment... "What happens is that everyone is sitting around, you're drinking colfee, painting; talking; and you end up talking to people you never woold Talk to otherwise," "itzgerald said, "Strangers, people who aren't in your immediate-realm, in your neighborhood, or your circle of friends." Apart from the appeal of a calming and welcoming atmosphere, Community Collaborative mural painting is also free.

Get your brushstrokes in on public art project

As an arts reporter, I felt like it was sort of a duty to participate in the "Re-constructing the Masters" public art project – until I sat at

one of the tables outside Amara Yoga & Art studio and actually began painting. Then J remembered how

relaxing and meditative paining can be and how much I love it.

And Kathryn Fitzgerald, who created the project, male it even easier. She mapped out on the canvases beforehand pieces of Vincent van Gogh's "Starry Night" for all of us to paint

All you had to do was paint, like you were coloring a page in a coloring book. You could use whatever colors you wanted — you didn't have to try to match adjacent pieces. And it seemed not imperative to stay within the lines.

We used washable tempera. Some colors like gold and silver had glitter in them. I liked the thickness of the paint and how I could create some van Gogh effects with it.

We painted at tables on the sidewalk in front of Amara on the east side of Lincoln Square Village; the sun and trees created their own dap-





Post-Project Evaluation

1. Accomplishments and how grants were utilized during the grant period

Grant funds were utilized for event publicity and supplies (See Fiscal Report for details). We were fortunate to also receive a grant from Student Cultural Programming to support some of the costs as well. Highlights from the Second Annual Asian Pacific American (APA) Heritage Month Festival include:

- 8 different performances, incorporating approximately 50 performers.
- 21 cultural-educational interactive booths, incorporating approximately 45 volunteers staffing different booths
- 9 Community groups, 11 Campus groups (Student/RSO), and 12 Campus Units were represented
- Ethnic groups represented: First-generation and beyond APA's in general, East Asian in general, South Asian in general, Hindi, Chinese, Indian, Pakistani, Japanese, Korean, Muslim, Pacific Islander, Sri Lankan, Hmong, Taiwanese.
- Champaign Mayor presented a proclamation for APA Heritage Month at the event and the Urbana Mayor sent her proclamation.

2. Impact that the grant funds had on your artistic/organizational development

We are very grateful for the expansion opportunities the Urbana Festival Grant allowed us in our 2nd Annual APA Heritage Month Celebration. Specifically, the funds allowed us to support and empower our community's APA performers' artistic development through small honorariums. Not only were they able to share their piece of Asian American heritage to attendees, but they are now able to invest in developing their art for more wide-spread exposure in the community. The grant also allowed us to cover expenses for supplies, so that this community event could not only be free to the public, but also truly authentic, including bona fide APA activities and cuisine samples.

Beyond the actual festival, the Urbana Arts Grant has also helped to give more weight and credibility to our Center and APA's on the community level. While we have worked on numerous occasions with the greater community in the past, this grant and event has lead to more collaboration in the community. On the University campus, it has also given us more credibility as a campus unit that is able to actively receive collaborative support from our community too.

3. # of participants from the public, and participating artists, performers, collaborators overall

Due to the nature and openness of the festival, it is quite difficult to estimate hard numbers of participants. Our estimation is approximately 400 attendees (this includes people who did not stay the entire two hours, but that came and went throughout the event).

4. Description of experience working with collaborating partners

The collaboration with both campus and community has been quite rewarding. Community and campus partners came together every month as we started planning this event in the Fall of 2009. Each partner brought their own contribution whether it was other collaborators or ideas and suggestions which helped to bring together a more open, diverse and united program. In the end, the success of the program was due in part to the commitment and participation of many partners who worked hard with us.



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


