

A Resolution Adopting a Policy on Amending the Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds

WHEREAS, the City of Urbana, Champaign County, Illinois, (the "City"), has been designated as an entitlement city under the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, and as such is eligible for Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") funds upon proper submittal being made to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD");

WHEREAS, HUD periodically establishes and publishes regulations governing the application for and the administration of CDBG funds by entitlement cities;

WHEREAS, HUD published a CDBG Program Final Rule in the Federal Register on September 6, 1988, which requires that cities applying for CDBG funds in 1989 adopt a policy for amending its Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds ("Final Statement"); and

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 8889-R23 on April 17, 1989, approving an application by the City for CDBG funds for the year beginning July 1, 1989; and

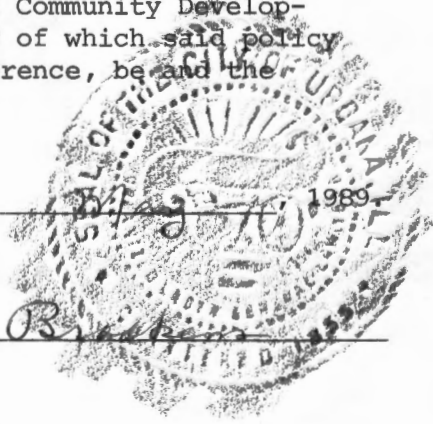
WHEREAS, on April 25, 1989, the Urbana Community Development Commission reviewed and recommended a policy for amending the Final Statement to the Urbana City Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of Urbana, Illinois, as follows:

That the Policy on Amending the Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds, a copy of which said policy is attached hereto and hereby incorporated by reference, be and the same is hereby approved.

CITY OF URBANA
COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM
POLICY ON AMENDING THE FINAL STATEMENT
OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OBJECTIVES
AND PROJECTED USE OF FUNDS

The City of Urbana shall formally amend its Community Development Block Grant Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds in the following situations.

1. The City decides not to carry out an activity as described in its published final statement.
2. The City decides to carry out an activity not previously described in its published final statement.
3. The City decides to substantially change the purpose, scope, location, or beneficiary of any activity described in its published final statement. The criteria for defining "substantial change" is as follows.
 - A. Purpose A substantial change of purpose occurs if the intent of the activity is different than the intent identified in the final statement or if the objective to be met by the activity is different than the objective identified in the final statement.
 - B. Scope A substantial change in scope occurs if the cost of an activity exceeds the cost of the activity as published in the final statement and as approved by the Urbana City Council by more than
 - 1) 50 percent for activities under \$50,000,
 - 2) 25 percent for activities greater than or equal to \$50,000 but less than \$100,000, or
 - 3) 10 percent for activities greater than or equal to \$100,000.
 - C. Location A substantial change in location occurs if the activity is provided in a geographic area other than the area identified in the final statement.
 - D. Beneficiary A substantial change in beneficiary occurs if persons allowed to participate in or receive services of a program included in the final statement are different than persons identified in the final statement.

If a proposed change requires a formal amendment to the final statement, the amendment shall not be effective until 1) a public hearing has been held to elicit citizen comment on the change, 2) the change has been approved by the Urbana City Council, and 3) the City has notified both the general public and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development of the change.
